Canadian investment expands U.S. plant-based food production

Based in Regina, Saskatchewan, AGT Foods is a global leader in plant-based proteins and value-added processing of pulses, grains, staple foods and ingredients for export and domestic markets. In the United States, AGT Foods USA operates facilities in Minot and Williston, North Dakota, processing pulses into products such as gluten-free pasta and innovative plant-based products. The company recently opened a multi-million-dollar Extrusion Center of Excellence in Minot, ND, that can process more than 9 million pounds of gluten free pasta, with the ability to expand to more than 40 million pounds - making it one of the largest facilities of its kind in the world. AGT Foods buys pulses, grains, oilseeds, and specialty crops from farmers near its facilities in the United States and Canada, including the North Dakota and the Canadian prairie provinces. This draws on high-quality grains from the region, while also ensuring farmers benefit from a strong local market, lower transportation costs, and greater value for their crops.



Regenerative agriculture, Cheerios & Canadian oats


As part of a commitment to advance regenerative agriculture practices on one million acres of North American farmland by 2030, Minnesota-based **General Mills**, one of the world's largest food companies, is providing support to dozens of oat farmers across Saskatchewan, Manitoba, and North Dakota. The farmers participate in a regenerative agriculture oat pilot project, which includes individualized coaching and other tools. This region of North America provides the oats for Cheerios and other leading General Mills brands.

Canadian ag tech meets North Dakota's innovation ecosystem

Toronto-based ag innovation company **Susterre** is pioneering the use of ultra-high pressure water jets in row crop planting applications, enabling regenerative practices like no-till farming that lower the cost of planting and extend the farmer's planting window. Susterre was selected to participate in the 2023 US AgTech Canadian Technology Accelerator program run by Global Affairs Canada. Through this program, Susterre explored and continues to build on opportunities in North Dakota. North Dakota's thriving agriculture innovation ecosystem is anchored by Grand Farm, an initiative by the organization **Emerging Prairie** that creates spaces where global stakeholders can come together to solve problems in agriculture. Working with Grand Farm, North Dakota State University, the North Dakota Soybean Council, and private farmers, Susterre is now testing its technology on corn and soybeans, two of the region's most common and resource-intensive crops.
